As he got older, he began to ask questions about how the barns were built. Then he began collecting the old tools that were used to build barns and other timber-frame structures. Rich continued to ask questions, study the construction techniques, read books and learn all he could about the process.

A few years ago Rich began to share what he'd learned using a show and tell technique. He doesn't travel light. He will bring along a collection of tools and pieces of barn timbers to illustrate his talk. Because Rich's talk has been very well received in other places, and because we plan to do more promotion than just within our organization, we will hold this meeting at the Walworth Town Hall to ensure there will be enough room for everyone.

Our commitment to preserve the history of the Walworth area is a year-round activity. The last program we presented in 2012 was on November 19; our doors were not closed for the winter at that time. Since then we set up a display for a children's program at the Walworth-Seely Public Library on the American Girl book series and World War II. Mary Jane and I brought a December program about our quilts to The Gardens on Canandaigua Road. It is always a good experience to share with others. Five WHS members went to the Webster Museum to view the 1812 Quilt Display that is traveling the Seaway Trail, and spent some time meeting with the Webster town and village historian. There is always a representative from WHS at the monthly meetings of WHO (Wayne Historians Organization); we will be hosting their meeting in June.

We had a total of 619 names in our visitor's book in 2012. 511 of those names reflect the times our members go to the museum to work on files, do research, or come for different events. 108 names are those of visitors attending programs or researching family ties in Walworth. Many of those doing genealogy research are from out of state, and have called for an appointment; someone is always available to help. As you can see from the amount of activity we are an active historical society. We are always looking for programs of interest to our members; if you have any program suggestions please contact a board member.

As we understand it, there were two other towers in Walworth: one behind the Lincoln Baptist Church and one on the hill on Kuttruff Road. The volunteer observer's duty was to report, using the phone provided, when planes flew overhead and to identify them. We have several items, given over the years, referring to this activity. These are the first photos we have received; one has a young Gordy Youngman in it.

January 3 - Almanac celebrates 200 years. The Old Farmers Almanac, the oldest continuously published magazine in the United States, marks its 200th anniversary.

January - Walworth gets \$500,000 to build housing units. The money was part of a state Affordable Housing Corp. grant.

January - P & C and CVS to move to new Macedon Plaza. The project will create several hundred construction jobs.

March - P & C is celebrating 50 years in the retail food business.

February 2 - Nettie Almekinder turns 102. Nettie resides at Towpath Manor in Palmyra.

February – Miss America pageant crooner Bert Parks dies at age 77. Parks serenaded the newly-crowned beauty queen each year until he was fired in 1980.

March 13 - Winter storm cripples area.

July - Walworth Food Pantry holds open house. Located at the Walworth Second Baptist Church, you will have an opportunity to tour the pantry and to see the facility, ask questions and meet members of the Board of Directors.

Join Us for a "Field Trip" By Gene Bavis

Most Americans have not visited interesting sites in their own backyards. I bet that is true of our members and friends, SO I am working on a "field trip" to Palmyra, Newark, and Lyons. We will visit the following:

First Stop: Aqueduct Park in Palmyra. There we would look at the remains of the aqueduct, the Aldrich Change Bridge, and the modern lock on the Erie Canal.

Second Stop: The Alling Coverlet Museum. It features the largest collection of American hand-woven coverlets in the United States. All styles of hand woven coverlets from 1820 to 1880 are represented in an extraordinary collection, which takes over six years to rotate through public display. The collection also includes a Quilt Room, looms, spinning wheels, and other assorted weaver's tools.

Third Stop: The Hoffman Clock Museum and the Newark Arcadia Historical Society Museum. (two museums across the street from one another). The Hoffman Clock Museum invites you to step into a "time machine" and to learn about the history of timekeeping! This unique collection of timepieces includes over 300 clocks, watches and tools. Exhibits introduce the visitor to the development of timekeeping technology and provide a wide variety of clock styles. A special emphasis on the history of New York State clockmakers makes this museum a truly exceptional place to visit. The Newark-Arcadia Historical Society has excellent collections of artifacts related to Newark and the surrounding area.

Fourth Stop: Lock #54 on the Enlarged Erie Canal located at Lock Berlin. See the remains of the old locks. Here we will also take time out for lunch.

Fifth Stop: The H.G. Hotchkiss Building. Here peppermint oil was extracted and bottled to be sent around the world.

Sixth Stop: The Wayne County Historian's Office. County Historian Peter Evans will introduce us to the vast genealogical and local history resources available to the public for their research. This is also the Wayne County Tourism Office.

Seventh Stop: The Wayne County Museum. Formerly the Sheriff's residence and Jail, the museum contains extensive collections of Wayne County artifacts.

We are currently hoping for either Tuesday, June 11, or Thursday, June 13, depending on the availability of docents at some of the various stops. To keep the cost to a minimum, we will meet at the Walworth Historical Society at 8 AM and form car pools. We are asking everyone to bring a bag lunch and beverage; bottled water will be provided. Our plan is to be back to Walworth no later than 5 PM.

Some of the places we visit will have a small admission charge while others only ask that we consider leaving a donation. To make bookkeeping easier, we will be asking each attendee to pay \$15.00 to cover these expenses. The money will be collected at check-in the morning of the trip and it needs to be in cash. We will have more details in our May newsletter when the date and event are finalized.

Reservations will be needed and we will limit participation to no more than 30. Those who register will be given a packet of information about each site we plan to visit and complete directions in advance. If this pilot project works out, future trips of a similar nature will be planned. There is much to see in our area.

November Meeting: War of 1812

Rev. Jake Dennie, pastor of Faith Methodist Church of Wolcott and member of Wolcott Historical Society's Board of Directors, spoke at our November meeting about the War of 1812. The British were competing for control of the Great Lakes and especially along Lake Ontario, where battles were fought from Fort Niagara to Sacketts Harbor, including Pultneyville, Sodus Point and Oswego.

The war started June 18, 1812 and ended in December 1814; however the British continued to fight by attempting to seize New Orleans. The Americans, led by Andrew Jackson, successfully repelled the British. Jackson soon became President. There were 291 British fatalities and 13 American fatalities. 1262 British and 39 Americans were injured. The British took 19 American prisoners and the Americans captured 48 British.


In a J. D. Kipp diary at our museum, 15 men from Walworth were listed as having fought in the war. This war enabled the U. S. A. the freedom to move west.

Carlyle Darron's Award

Carlyle Darron, WHS member, former Walworth Town Supervisor for eight years, retired Walworth dairy farmer, and long-time member of the Wayne County Holstein Club, was recently honored by receiving an award for showing Holstein cows at the Wayne County Fair for 75 consecutive years.

When he was ten years old, he started showing Holsteins at the Wayne County Fair. This is a very impressive run. It takes hard work and extreme dedication to accomplish a feat such as this. To put it into perspective, about the time Carlyle started showing Holsteins, Orson Wells had his famous radio broadcast of "War of the Worlds," a gallon of gas cost about 10 cents, the first issue of Superman magazine was published, and Babe Ruth had been retired from baseball for less than a year.



Carlyle has received numerous awards from other fairs and organizations. In 1992 he retired from milking cows but still raised steers. For the last 65 years he has also bred Sheltie dogs. Carlyle and his wife Doris have three children, nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

It is obvious Carlyle has had a very busy life with his family and farming career. Our congratulations to him for winning this award and our thanks for his years of dedication to dairy farming and public service here in Walworth. In 2011 the Walworth Historical Society presented him with our Community Service Award for his dedication to this community and its people.


