A Tour of Main Street: #3698 – Wick's Hardware- Part 3

Editor's Note: The east-side tour of Main Street continues from our March 2018 issue which featured Part 2 - the building at #3698 Main Street owned by the K.O.T.M. (Knights of the Maccabees). Part 3 includes the first-floor store operated by Jack Wick. We are grateful to Gordon and his grandson, Aaron, for sharing their memories of this building and for the time they spent researching and documenting this information.

Wick's Hardware

Charles and Vivian Buckley operated a general store on the first floor of the Knights of the Maccabees building since the early 1940's. Charles passed away in 1944 and Vivian purchased the building from the K.O.T.M. in June 1945. Vivian and their daughter Jean continued with the business until 1948, when they sold it to Jack and Blanche Wick. Jack operated the business as a hardware store only, because at this time there was no need to have two stores with the same merchandise next to each other.

The store to the north of Wick's was owned by Joe Finley and in the fall of 1950 Joe rented it to Gordon and Katie Youngman. Youngman's Variety sold clothing, magazines, footwear, and many other items; the big favorite at the store was the soda fountain. Additional information about the north store will be printed in a future issue.

In 1964 Blanche passed away and Jack continued on until December 1971 when he became sick. The family kept the store open until after Christmas, and then closed it in hopes of finding a buyer.

Information shared at Walworth Memories programs:

 Oct. 2010: When Kathy Yuker Aeckerle was interviewed on the radio, she was asked what she wanted for Christmas. Her reply was "The doll in Jack Wick's hardware store window." When Kathy returned home Jack gave her the doll as a thank you for the free advertising.

A History of 3921 Walworth-Ontario Road

The 1829 Burr Atlas does not appear to indicate any development in the area that I estimate to be the site of my old home, so it appears likely construction on that property took place in the 1830's. Later 19th Century Atlases depict the property as being owned first by an A. C. Smith and later a J. Green. Before my parents bought the property, it was referred to by neighbors as the Down's place.

The initial structure on the farmstead was probably constructed in the 1830's at the southeast corner, some 150 feet from the road. The house was $1\frac{1}{2}$ stories high, $16' \times 20'$ in size. About a decade later, a $16' \times 30'$ one-story addition was built on the north side of the original building and contained a kitchen and pantry on the westerly half and a dining room.

<u>Editor's Notes:</u> Gilbert Smith now lives in Canandaigua, but from 1938 – 1949 his family (Clayton and Emily Smith and children Wendell and Gilbert) lived at 3921 Walworth-Ontario Road. We recently received an envelope from Gilbert containing photos, site plan, history and descriptions of the property. The current owner is Dawn Lander (current photo of the home is to the left). Gilbert's excerpts are printed above.

Gilbert also provided detailed information about the numerous outbuildings on the property, including a multi-hole outhouse, a shed used to hang wash in the winter, a barn that sheltered cattle and stored granary and hay, an equipment barn with the date 1865 painted inside it, and a pig pen. His complete narrative is on file at our museum.

Most of the "stuff" came from the Bavis collection of antiques, but a few things were brought in by George Mandery, Larry Ruth, Roger and Jessie Keymel, Becky Appleman, Susan Herrman, Anne Lorah, and Barb and Ray Crawford. A few objects were from the WHS collections.

Among the objects displayed and identified were a fleem, tooth extractor, hog scraper, log marking hammer, cooper's hoop drivers, poultry de-beeker, 18th century wig curling iron, ferrier's hoof knives and buttress, horseshoe calks, travelers, husking pins/pegs, dibbles, and a Kanak war club from the South Sea Islands. A few items could not be positively identified. There was great audience participation and we had fun. Afterwards, we enjoyed some delicious refreshments and fellowship.

Who Remembers Marilyn Wallace? By Mary Jane Devlin



Marilyn Wallace and her husband, Clyde, lived in the Walworth area while their children were growing up. Ruth Marilyn Decker Wallace was born October 9, 1924, in Rochester, NY to Harlow and Roberta Decker. Her father was a bricklayer and later worked at Gleason Works. She had one brother, Richard, who is deceased. She went to 15 different schools while she was growing up. She had rheumatic fever twice which left her with a heart murmur for several years. However, she eventually outgrew the murmur.

Marilyn and Clyde had five children: Donna, Cindy, and Lori who all live in North Carolina near her. Her son, David, lives in Macedon and a daughter, Sandy, lives in Webster. Her husband, Clyde worked at Gleason Works along with her father.

Her mother and her brother had joined the Army during World War II, so when Marilyn was 18 she joined. She took boot camp at Fort Dix, New Jersey. She said it was a wonderful experience. She didn't even mind doing the pots and pans on KP because everybody got along. However, she didn't like guard duty because the young officers would give them a hard time if the officers realized they were rookies. She signed up to serve in China (tug boat). There were approximately 256 people in her platoon and she wasn't picked to go to China.

Marilyn joined the Army but they sent her to train to be a medical technician, and then transferred her to the Army Air Force. She also trained at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. She was in service for a year and a half before she was discharged in 1946.

Marilyn, Clyde and their family lived at 3959 Walworth-Ontario Road in Walworth while their children were growing up. While they lived there Marilyn babysat and was a foster mother. She had a monkey and raised pigeons. Their house burned and they lived in the converted barn.

Marilyn moved to Lincolnton, North Carolina to be near her daughters and grandchildren. She still lives there and recently celebrated her 90th birthday.
