"Indentured Servants in Marion, NY"

Why would a person leave his family home and move across the ocean to a country with an unfamiliar language and an unknown life? What would cause a person to willingly commit himself to seven years of labor and bondage? And following the servitude, how would a person assimilate into the new culture and achieve fulfillment?

Peter Magilson did those exact things. Around 1850, he left Holland and went to America by indenturing himself to a Marion farmer. In 1854, Susan Malgee did the same. After working off their obligations, they became part of the Marion farming community, raised a family and prospered.

"Indentured Servants in Marion, NY – Peter and Susan Magilson" is their story. Told by great, great granddaughter Lucinda Hance Collier (photo above by Caryn Devlin, Marion Town Historian), it is an oral history passed down by the generations and accompanied with treasured artifacts. It is a story of hope, trust, courage, commitment and faith.

A Tour of Main Street: #3700 – Hacket/Baker - Part 1 By Gordon Youngman and Aaron Fernaays

Editor's Note: Our tour continues to the north, spotlighting the stores and homes located on the east side of Main Street. The building at #3700 was the site of many businesses owned by Nathan Hacket, John Baker, Joe Finley, Gordon Youngman, and, currently, Dan Hall. Part 1 features ownership by Nathan Hacket and John Baker and Sons. Thank you to Gordon Youngman and his grandson, Aaron Fernaays, for sharing their memories and for the time they spent researching and documenting the information about the stores located at 3698 and 3700 Main Street.

From 1855 - 1899 John Baker and his wife, Lucy, operated a grocery and general store under the name of J. W. Baker. The main products for resale included dry goods – groceries, wallpaper, hardware, fancy goods, crockery, patent medicines, paints, oil, glass and dye stuffs. This information was taken from a sales slip issued to a Mr. Jones. In a March 8, 1902, letter to Mrs. Jones, Mr. Baker wrote the following: "Dear Madam: Are your hens laying? Are they merely supplying the table or have you eggs to sell? Anybody's chickens will lay 10 ¢ eggs but we will guarantee that your hens will lay more, when eggs are high, if you come in at once and get a package of Dr. Hess' Poultry Pan-A-CE-A, and add it to the feed each morning as directed. J. W. Baker's Sons, General Merchandise, Walworth, NY."

After the death of John Baker on October 29, 1899, the store remained in Lucy Baker's control. The business was carried on by the Baker's two sons, William A. and Charles H., under the name of J. W. Baker's Sons. Following the August 9, 1912, death of Lucy, the property was deeded to the two sons and a daughter, Laura E. Chase. At the time of the final transfer on October 6, 1914, Lucy signed her share to her brothers. On April 21, 1915, the Baker sons sold the business to Charles W. Clark; this also included the home next door.

Many years later Gordon Youngman purchased both properties and they became known as Walworth Hardware.

The following are excerpts from information documented by Gordon in March 2000:

The first records I could find for this property was the transfer of a lot from Nathan Hacket to John W. Baker on October 29, 1855, for \$1,200. The store John built eventually became Walworth Hardware. The purchase price also included the house to the north of the lot.

The 2018 Walworth Festival in the Park was on July 27 and 28 at Ginegaw Park. The theme for this year's festival was "Holidays." This was the 28th annual festival and was sponsored by the Walworth Lions Club and the Town of Walworth. As many know, this festival features a parade on Friday night that travels through town and down to Ginegaw Park. Organizations from the area show their support by entering floats that are in the spirit of the yearly theme. So, work on these floats starts early for the organizations who choose to enter. The Walworth Historical Society chose "Flag Day" as the theme for our float. On the Tuesday previous to the parade date, fearless volunteers met at Keymel's barn to assemble the float on one of Roger's and Jessie's wagons. The Walworth Historical Society also sponsored a booth in the park following the parade and again on Saturday. Honoring Flag Day By Jessie Keymel

The theme of the 28th annual Festival in the Park parade was "Holidays." We chose Flag Day, June 14, as the special holiday for the historical society's float. The first national observance of Flag Day was in 1877. Although Presidents Wilson in 1916 and Coolidge in 1927 proposed Flag Day, it was not until 1949, under President Truman, that Congress recognized the anniversary of the adoption, on June 14, 1877, by the Continental Congress, of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States of America. *

Our choice gave us a chance to share the stories of the flags we preserve at the museum. The flag that is always on display in our meeting room was brought to us in 1989 by Dorothy Hack. It is the flag from Walworth Grange #289. The original Grange charter from 1873 hangs on the west wall of the meeting room. Also on the same wall is a tribute to the Grange whose generous monetary gift of their community service project made it possible for the Walworth Historical Society to build our museum.

Our oldest and certainly our biggest flag is 12 ft. by 24 ft. and was displayed across the front of the Pacific Hotel on June 10, 1891. There are 44 stars on this flag. The occasion was to celebrate President Cleveland's visit to our town for the wedding of his nieces, Nellie and Anne Yeomans.

We have the flag that draped the coffin of George Frowley, a WWI Army Veteran, in 1935. This flag was presented to his family in honor of his service, a solemn custom that is still practiced. We have an old small classroom flag with 48 stars and an 8 ft. by 12 ft. flag that was accessioned in 2004; it was left at the town hall. We do not have a history on either of those flags, they were anonymously donated.

Our newest flag hangs in a frame on the wall by the kitchen. On May 10, 2014, it was flown over the U. S. Embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan. This flag was presented to us by Lieutenant Colonel Jeffery R. Bavis, who was special Operations Liaison in Kabul at that time.

Our float was wrapped in a red, white and blue bunting with a field of flags provided by the Ontario American Legion. The high-flying Grange flag was paired with a duplicate of the 1877 flag, provided by WHS board member Larry Ruth, who headed our parade float committee this year.

The Year Was 1961 By Dorothy French

The following information appeared in the Wayne County Mail and is reprinted with their permission.

<u>May 5</u>: Walworth Choraleers presented "Dawn 'Til Dark in Central Park." The group was formed through the Adult Education program at Wayne Central School. Musical director was Wilbur Reybrouck. Officers were Helen Schultz, president; Mrs. Juanita Ebert, secretary; and John Traas, treasurer.

<u>July 7:</u> Open house was held at Walworth Second Baptist Church, following rededication of a completely redecorated sanctuary. The Board of Trustees, helped by some 55 church members, completed the entire project in six weeks.

October 20: Tension resulting from nuclear testing by Russia and the Berlin crisis resulted in the Ontario Town Board setting up a fall-out information center for local residents. A study will identify suitable structures, according to Supervisor Earl Casey. Some individuals have already begun construction of these shelters at their homes. Fall-out shelters will be discussed at the monthly meeting of Walworth Elementary PTA. A special Civil Defense program, in cooperation with Walworth Chamber of Commerce, will be presented.

Walworth Area Country Doctors: West Walworth By Dorothy French

Editor's Note: Through the years the Walworth area has been serviced by numerous medical doctors. This is the first in a series about these physicians who practiced their version of today's urgent care and made houses calls, often on horseback.

This issue features the early doctors of West Walworth. This information was obtained from a historical report written by Mrs. Charles Peters of West Walworth prior to 1934.

Dr. William Hall: One of the first doctors was Dr. Hall, who came to West Walworth in 1852 and lived in the house "now owned by Frank Welker."

Dr. Christ Fuller: Dr. Fuller arrived in West Walworth in 1857. His office was located in the Bills block, situated at the southwest corner of West Walworth and Bills Roads. After remaining ten years, he moved to Fairport.

Dr. J. B. Cowles: Dr. Cowles came next, remained almost five years and then moved to Fairport. For several months the village was without a doctor.

Dr. Robert Morris: In May 1875, Dr. Morris, a young medical doctor just out of college, "looked the ground over and concluded to remain here." According to Mrs. Peters, the doctor's office was located in the house owned by Mrs. Helen Dillon, now owned by Carl Lotze. At the end of the first year, Dr. Morris moved to the first house to the south, where he boarded for four years with Elizabeth Bancroft. In 1860, he married, purchased the house and lived there for ten years. He then sold his place and moved to Lincoln, "where he has continued to live until this day. He kept his office for more than 46 years and throughout this entire time he has only once been away from his office more than 15 days at a time. Dr. Morris is still on the job and holds a high position in the esteem and respect of the community." *Editor's Note: Dr. Morris passed away in 1934. He will be featured in a future newsletter.*

First a Post Office, Then a Pool Hall By Dorothy French





Top left: 1890: Barely visible at the right of the photo is a small white building, This was Walworth's first post office and was located on the east side of Main Street (the current location of New York State Sitepower, formerly Walworth Hardware.) The building was moved prior to 1902 to make room for the K.O.T.M. structure owned by the Knights of the Maccabees.

Top right: Date unknown: The post office became a pool hall and was moved prior to 1902 to the front yard at 2200 Church Street, the second house west of the Walworth Methodist Church. The property is owned by Doug Nichol and Mary Jo Pringle. Previous owners were Art Orton in the '60's and 70's and then earlier, John McLouth. The young boy in the photo is Ashel Buckley.

National Night Out 2018 By Bob Mogray

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that brings together area fire and ambulance departments, law enforcement personnel, and other local groups in a positive setting.

Matt Peskin, founder and executive director of National Association of Town Watch, introduced the National Night Out program in 1984. Peskin realized that hundreds of community watch groups existed without a platform or association to connect them together. Neighborhoods across the nation began to host block parties, festivals, parades, cookouts and various other community events with safety demonstrations, seminars, youth events, visits from emergency personnel, exhibits and much, much more. Today, 38 million neighbors in 16 thousand communities across the nation take part in National Night Out.

On July 31 of this year the Walworth National Night Out was held at the Gananda High School. Participation this year included the following:

WHS Fall Open House Featuring Cathy McGrath By Gene Bavis and Cathy McGrath

On Sunday, October 7, from 2 PM until 4 PM, the Walworth Historical Society's museum will be open with special exhibits and a wonderful program "The Heart of American Music" by Cathy McGrath. Her program begins around 2:30 PM.

Based on research done for music for the Genesee Country Village and Museum with Flint Hill Folk, Cathy McGrath presents a program of nineteenth century heritage music in authentic period dress and with instruments appropriate to the era. The audience is encouraged to participate by singing their hearts out!



Songs are chosen from two books which were collections compiled from thousands of people who sent in their favorite songs of the previous century. From *Heart Songs* (1909): "Each song recalls to the individual reader some tender, sad, joyous or martial association." From Songs That Never Grow Old (1903): "A collection of old-time songs that have long been tried and forever loved." Songs of all sorts of categories are presented - love, home, Erie Canal, historic, patriotic, dancing, popular and folk songs - and represent a valuable gauge to the popular taste in music of that time. These melodies are part of our collective past, yet still resonate today.

An experienced folk music performer, Cathy uses an 1870's guitar, limberjack puppets, antique flute, and rolled tin whistle in this historical program and encourages audience participation. The event includes a FREE Ice Cream Social. Please bring a friend, child or grandchild and join us for an interesting and educational afternoon. Kids will love the program (and the ice cream!).
