Gordon and Betty Youngman Interview By Bob Mogray

Gordon Youngman, or "Gordy" as many call him, is a life-long Walworthian as well as a local businessman and friend to many! Because of his historic local ties he has contributed to many stories in our past newsletters. He and his family have been excellent sources of historic dates and events. Gordy has also contributed many photographs of local families and buildings that have been stored at the museum; these have also been scanned and backed up on our computer. He has granted this interview which is a personal look into his life story.

Gordon Youngman was born on June 18, 1928 in the second house down the hill east of the Walworth Post office; the house is the current Heinonen family home. Gordy's family consisted of his father Ezra, his mother Ida, brother Bill, and sisters Ester, Leona, Bessie, and Edith. He and his family lived in this house for approximately five years, until he started school at the Walworth High School. Gordy started directly in the first grade and did not go to kindergarten. He and his family then had moved into the next house west of Jay Taber's cobblestone house on the Walworth-Penfield Road. They stayed there for about two years. They moved again, this time into the second house north on the west side of Main Street past Center Street. This occurred when he was seven years old in 1935. We jump ahead until 1945 when Gordy graduated from Walworth High School.

Let's skip ahead a few years until 1949. In October of that year he married Katie Luke who lived on Plank Road. They moved to a house that was between the Baptist Church and the old Masonic Hall. At this time Gordy and Katie rented from DeWitt Tuttle and operated an ice-cream and candy store. This house was later torn down. As you can see, there was a lot of moving around in Gordy's life and one year later in 1950 he and Katie again moved. This time they moved across the street to the second floor apartment in the left side of the store that would later become his hardware store.

For three years they lived here and in 1953 Gordy was drafted into the U.S. Army. Joe and Lorraine Finley bought his store and operated it for the two years he was in the service. While in the Army he served in Okinawa, Japan in the counter-intelligence corps for two years. When Gordy returned home he bought the store from Joe Finley. So by 1955 he was back in business at the store. In 1958 you guessed it! He moved again! This time he and Katie bought the big house on the north side of the store and moved into it. Three years later Gordy enlarged the store - 12 feet to the north and 30 feet onto the back. During the years that Gordy owned and operated the variety and hardware businesses in the stores on Main Street in Walworth, he was active as a volunteer fireman and in the volunteer ambulance also. As a matter of fact, there was a fire and ambulance emergency button in the store and his phone number was listed as an emergency contact for local fire and ambulance calls. When a call came in, Gordy would push the button and the fire siren would sound. Responders would know to report to the fire hall to answer the call.

Gordy and Katie had two daughters. Marlene was born in 1954 and Kathy was born in 1957. Gordy and Katie bought the north store in 1963 and initially ran it as a variety store and also had an ice-cream counter. In 1978 they closed the ice-cream fountain. They bought the hardware store (the former K.O.T.M. building to the south of the variety store) from the estate of Jack Wick in 1972.

From then on only hardware was sold there and it became the Walworth Hardware business until 1990 when he retired and sold the business to their daughter Marlene and her husband Steve, who ran the business until 2011 when they closed the hardware store.



After Gordon retired, his wife Katie passed away in February of 2001. Over a year passed when Gordy went to a Walworth Alumni banquet where he met Betty Garlock. Betty had lived in the "Huddle" area of Walworth when she was younger. Gordy and Betty had actually dated each other in high school. Betty was a junior when Gordy graduated as a senior.

Betty's husband had passed years earlier in 1992. Soon they were spending a lot of time together and they married in 2008. They now live in Greece, New York. Betty had 5 daughters, 12 grandchildren, and 15 great-grandchildren. Gordy had 2 daughters, 4 grandchildren, and 8 great-grandchildren.

The Walworth Historical Society would like to thank Gordy and Betty for taking time out of their busy lives to travel to Walworth to grant this interview. We all really appreciate all of the things that Gordon has done to help the people of the Walworth area over the years and for providing photos and information about the early history of our town. In 2000 Gordon Youngman received the WHS Community Service Award for volunteering his time and efforts to better the community and its people.

Former Walworth Woman Honored By Mary Jane Devlin

Cortland County recently inducted Bessie Mabel Seely into their Hall of Fame. The Cincinnatus Area Heritage Society nominated her.

Bessie was born in 1881 to Jay and Sarah Seely. Her father had a tinsmithing shop at 2256 Walworth-Marion Road where Roxy's Salon is now located. She was the first woman to graduate from Syracuse University, School of Law, and the first woman accepted to the New York State Bar.

Bessie's career began as a law clerk in a Syracuse law firm; she soon became a partner. She then joined the banking industry with positions in Syracuse and Detroit. While in Detroit she wrote columns for the "The Detroit Banker" and the magazine of the American Institute of Banking. She also lectured and did public speaking.

In the 1930's she moved back to the Rochester area to help with her aging parents. Following her father's death, Bessie resided in the living quarters of his building. She settled her father's estate in 1958 by giving his tinsmith shop to the Walworth Chamber of Commerce with the stipulation that it be used for educational and cultural benefits of area residents. On August 19, 1962 it became the town library. The library is now located at the town hall complex and is named after the Seely family.

Bessie later moved to Cincinnatus when she inherited a home from her brother-in-law. While living there she became a member of the Cortland County Historical Society and joined the Board of the Kellogg Free Library. In her retirement, she corresponded with several servicemen, pursued her interest in textile arts and continued to be an avid reader.

Bessie passed away in 1981 at the age of 100. She willed her historic home to the Kellogg Free Library and the balance of her estate in trust to two educational institutions.

Congratulations to Bessie Mabel Seely on all her achievements.

Bob is also our Vice-President and co-ordinates many of our programs that include the use of our computer program. He also presents programs about our history to other organizations in the community.

Wayne County Bicentennial By Gene Bavis

On April 16 the Wayne County Board of Supervisors appointed Larry Ann Evans (Executive Director of the Museum of Wayne County History) and me as co-chairs of the upcoming Wayne County Bicentennial Committee. On April 11, 1823, Wayne County was established by the New York State Legislature when it created a new county from land that was formerly part of Seneca and Ontario Counties One interesting point is that this is my second appointment to serve on a county-wide planning committee. I served as co-chair of the Wayne County Sesquicentennial back in 1972-73.

While we are in the very early planning stages, our hope is that EVERY community and organization in Wayne County will take part in some way. This is our opportunity to PROMOTE local history. It is local history that got me interested in becoming a social studies teacher long ago. While things like ancient Greek or Roman history is somewhat interesting, there is nothing like being able to see first hand where something happened or learn how things you can see first hand developed. Bicentennial reports will be made regularly, so please keep your eye open for them both here and via local media and on websites.

As Walworth Town Historian and as a trustee of the Walworth Historical Society, I am an active member of WHO which stands for Wayne Historians Organization. It is a loosely organized group of municipal historians and representatives of local historical societies that meets 6 times a year to discuss what's going on and to help each other.

About 6 years ago, I proposed a historic sites database using an Excel spreadsheet and Word documents. I worked on it with the help of a few others, but it was really slow going until last October when Jim Paprocki from Sodus told me at a WHO meeting that he thought he could create an on-line database that many contributors could work on AND which could be easily available to the public to see. By November, he had a prototype available to show State Historian Devin Lander when he visited our County. Mr. Lander was very impressed. Over the winter, several of us worked out some kinks and about a month ago, we went "public." While the database still needs work and will always be a work in progress, it contains nearly 1000 sites of interest to historians and those who enjoy local history. To view the database, look up www.waynehistorians.org. You can search by town and by category. Take a look, please.

You may be wondering what the historic sites database has to do with the Bicentennial. While they are two different things, the database can be used to create custom tours and we believe that tours could be a great way to promote our local heritage.




