

Craftsmen

Before the days of machines, many of the tools and things people used had to be made by hand. The following are just some of the crafts that would have been common in the 1800's but uncommon today.

Blacksmith – made tools and household objects out of iron & steel. Some blacksmiths made horseshoes, too.

Cooper - made buckets, barrels and various other containers out of wood.

Tanner – tanned hides into leather so that they could be used make items such as shoes and harnesses for horses.

Miller – ran a gristmill where he turned grain into flour for bread and baked goods.


Mason - built houses and other structures out of stone or bricks.


Sawyer - ran a sawmill and cut logs into boards . Sawmills and gristmills were often powered by running water.

Some are named after a family that lived on that street or road.


Some are named for a building or activity that took place on that street or road.

Some are named for the material used in making the street or road.






WAYNE COUNTY MAP



Miscellaneous historical facts:

The Town of Walworth was incorporated in April 20, 1829. The first non-native American settlers arrived in 1798.

Walworth was named in honor of Reuben Hyde Walworth, the last chancellor of New York State. A chancellor was a chief judge of a court of chancery or equity. Equity jurisprudence covered many matters regarding the rights of lunatics and infants and handled trusts and frauds similar to State Supreme Court.

Theron Gilbert Yeomans moved to Walworth in 1830 and began a nursery business, planting extensive orchards. He served as town clerk, postmaster, justice of the peace, town supervisor, and New York State Assemblyman. He and his wife, Lydia, lived on High Street in the spacious home known as Evergreen Place opposite Academy Street. He imported Copper Beach trees, 11 of which can still be found growing in the hamlet including one on the Historical Society property.

President Grover Cleveland visited Walworth in 1891 to attend the wedding of his nieces; his sister, Susan, was married to Lucien T. Yeomans. Mr. Cleveland served two terms as President: 1884 – 1888 and 1892 – 1896. He is our only President to serve two terms that were not consecutive.
