

### A Tour of Lincoln Farms By Bill Boyd



I had the honor of narrating the "Farms of Lincoln" presentation at the March 21 meeting of the Walworth Historical Society. The meeting was well attended and received by those in attendance at the Lodge at Ginegaw Park.

Over the years there have been other farming endeavors in the Lincoln community. The first one that I recall was Louie Wahl at **449 Plank Road**. He and his wife Martha farmed small vegetables and some fruit. I remember one daughter, Linda.

Next would be **3108 Plank Road** which was owned by Wilbur Leaty. He had fruit trees including apples, cherries and peaches. In 1953 the farm was purchased by William Boyd and wife, Till. With the county-wide re-numbering in the fifties the house became 599 Plank Road. Children are Nancy, Bill and Ellen.

Around the corner at **5103 Lincoln Road** was Ellis and Emma Collier. Their land adjoined 599 Plank Road. Ellis grew apples and cherries and had a small hay lot. They had one daughter, Jean. This farm was later purchased by Lee and Marlene Slocum.

On **Plank Road** farther east was the farm owned by Sid Schoenwald. The house was on the north side of Plank Road at the end of Tiffany Road. The barn was on the southwest corner of that same intersection. The barn burned in the fifties. Sid and Evelyn and their four children (Laura, Kip, Justin and Nicholas) built a new house at **1185 Plank Road**, just west of the old house. Later the old house was torn down. Some years later Sid bought the Bushwood farm at **876 Burrow Road**, directly across from Old School House Road. Today that house is occupied by Justin Schoenwald.

On Lincoln Road close to Whitney Road was the Clow farm at **5555 Lincoln Road**. It was owned by Howard and Vera Clow and their son, Garth. The house was on the west side of the road and the dairy barn was on the east side of the road. The barn has been torn down and replaced by new homes. Garth was a commercial farmer. He had the combine, bailer and other equipment to do work for smaller farms in the area. In 1958 the Clows built a new home on the southwest corner of Lincoln and Whitney Roads. This home at **5585 Lincoln Road** was a Sears-Roebuck catalog house. 5585 Lincoln Road is now occupied by Sandy Allen, who is a second cousin to Garth Clow.

Larry Hill's Hohner piano accordion was recently donated to the museum by his wife, Molly Ebert Hill. Larry was a wellknown band leader from the 50's to the 90's. He formed a band called "Larry and the The Music Makers". The band played for square dances at fire halls, at private parties and anywhere else he was requested to do so. He also played with other bands when one of their own members was unable to play and they reciprocated by helping him when one of his members was unable to play on a certain night for some reason. The band members were John Duffy, Eddie Merrill, Larry Hill, Glenn Hyman, and Owen Bassage.

Larry was born in West Walworth and died on June 28, 2021. He was one of seven children. He attended Walworth schools. His father, Forrest, played the fiddle and that is who taught him to play.

The Walworth Historical Society featured Larry and Molly in the September 2015 newsletter. They were interviewed by Dawn Russell, who wrote the article. We thank Molly for thinking of us with such a unique donation.

### President's Report By Becky Appleman

#### Happy Spring! With the good weather comes a busy time for WHS.

**Home Town Hero's Banners:** I wanted to bring everyone up to date on our latest project. WHS is working in conjunction with the Home Town Hero's Banner Committee to bring the Walworth heroes to our hometown streets. Some of the lampposts along Route 441 from the U.S. Post Office to Tops Market, as well as some on Lorraine Drive leading to the town complex and two town-owned poles in Lincoln, are currently being considered.

Banners range in price from \$98.00 to \$150.00 depending on size. An 18"x36" size would be placed on the shorter townowned lampposts and the 30"x60" would go on utility poles. The committee is currently working on permits for NYSEG and RG&E to use their poles. They hope to have more poles available as they get further into this project. These banners would be displayed from Memorial Day to Veterans Day and would be removed and stored each year by the Walworth Highway Department.

If you would like to purchase a banner for a friend or family members who served in the military, we would love to hear from you. A photo and some form of verification will be needed upon completion of your application. The WHS will also retain a copy of this information for our records. The banners are being produced locally by the Lettering Lounge at 6160 South Avenue in Williamson. Because we are a 501(C)(3) organization, WHS will be handling the money and applications; we will be communicating with the Lettering Lounge concerning orders. The committee is currently at the limit for poles until they get permission from the utility companies. The applications and instructions will be on our website and questions can be directed to either Bob Anderson at 585-737-9577 or myself at 585-703-1559. We look forward to your input.

### The Reverse Curves Quilt Club By Bob Mogray



The Reverse Curves Quilt Club is a local group of talented ladies who started the club in 1974. Gwyn Bassage was inspired by a trip to the Quilt Shop in Webster. She signed up for a beginners' class there and later another advanced class. Soon Gwyn was asked to share her knowledge and talent by teaching a class at the Walworth-Seely Public Library. Later that fall Gwyn had a new group of quilters who included Mary McGahen, Phyllis Dake, Rita Keating, Adele Simmons, Jackie Brunner, Nancy and Patty Benedict, Bertha Masclee, June Wass, Jane Holihan, Peg Frances, Betty Lehr, Diane Lucey, and Gerry Whitmire. For the next two years Gwyn taught more classes.

In 1978 they held their first show to display their quilts at the Walworth Street Dance. The early name of the group was "The Samplers" but was soon changed to "The Reverse Curves Quilt Club", a humorous reference to their body figures and not a type of quilt block. They met on Wednesdays in each other's homes and brought sandwiches to eat, just as they do now.

By 1978 they had constructed a Dresden Plate quilt that was raffled off and the money was donated to the Walworth-Seely Public Library. During the Walworth Sesquicentennial year, the Reverse Curves Quilt Club made a quilt for the Walworth Historical Society. For the construction of this quilt, Walworth Town Historian Gene Bavis provided slides of historical importance to serve as a guide for the individual panels of the quilt. When finished, it was presented to the WHS in 1989 and it was displayed in a parade on Street Dance day. Later it was shown for two days at the Walworth Elementary School and is periodically displayed at the Walworth Historical Society Museum on Academy Street.



Until 1981 their group was loosely organized but then they started taking minutes at their meetings and keeping closer track of their finances. The first officers were: President Gwyn Bassage, Secretary Marty Davis, and Treasurer Phyllis Dake. After that they participated in numerous quilt shows, raffles, and school events.

This organization is still very active and participates in educational programs, donates to the Ronald McDonald House, the Macedon Scout Camporama, the Walworth Historical Society, and the Wayne County Bicentennial project. They are a great group of selfless women who share their talents and support various charities. We are looking forward to seeing the photo quilt they will create for the Wayne County Bicentennial in 2023 which will contain pictures from each town in Wayne County.

Thank you for all of your efforts over the years and continued good luck in the future!

# <u>The Boyntons of Boynton Road: Part I</u> By Dorothy French Samuel and Mary's family

Samuel & Mary George Lorenzo Frank, Mary, George, Willis, L.R., Charles



In 1806 three generations of Boyntons came from Massachusetts to Walworth, "an almost unbroken wilderness", according to a Boynton family genealogy.

**Samuel and Mary (Robinson) Boynton:** Parents of 6 children including Jonathan and George. Samuel was born in Massachusetts, baptized in 1751, and served as a private in the Revolutionary War. As a youngster, Mary lived with the family of Robert Treat Payne, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. Samuel died in 1793 but it is unknown where he is buried. Mary spent her last days with her son, George. She died in 1841 and is buried in Freewill Cemetery.

Jonathan Boynton: Son of Samuel and Mary. The Honorable Jonathan Boynton was born August 10, 1779 in Stockbridge, Mass. He married Elizabeth Smith, who was born September 6, 1783. Jonathan, Elizabeth and their daughter Caroline moved here in 1806 with his parents and had five more children, including Charles. Elizabeth passed away in 1816. In 1817 Jonathan married Minerva Smith who was born January 15, 1797 and died September 18, 1853. They had two children, Julia and Samuel. Jonathan was Justice of the Peace for more than 20 years, held the office of Judge, and was a member of the New York State Legislature from 1827 to 1831. Jonathan and his two wives are buried in Freewill Cemetery. At the time of Jonathan's death March 28,1845 the home farm contained 500 acres. The farm was located on the east side of Boynton Road, half way between Walworth-Marion Road and Smith Hill Road.

<u>Charles Boynton:</u> Son of Jonathan and Minerva and born in 1833. Charles married Mary Robbins and they were parents of Frederick (Fred)., Mary, Frances, and Julia. For 10 years they lived on a small farm west of Walworth village. They later moved to a farm east of Walworth village on Boynton Road.

**Frederick (Fred) A. Boynton:** Son of Charles and Mary and born in 1856. Fred married Eva (born 1871) and they were parents of Bessie, Carlyle, and Lucy. The family lived on a farm two miles east of the village on Boynton Road.

Following his wife's death in 1905 after giving birth to Lucy, Fred asked neighbors Frank and Anna Dumond to move in with them and take care of their three motherless children. After Frank's death in 1927 Anna, a well-known member of the Walworth Methodist Church, married Fred. Anna died in 1958 after giving 50 years of her life to an orphaned neighbor family. She lived to see Carlyle, her stepson, graduate from college.

Fred was an auctioneer in the 1920's. His auctioneering soon became more and more important and his farming less and less important. The family moved to the village where they established family pew #52 in the Methodist Church. Fred would begin auctioning in April when the farmers started to work their farms. He died November 29, 1936. Fred, Eva, Frank and Anna are buried in Baker Road Cemetery.

### **2022 Walworth Festival in the Park** By Bob Mogray



### The Story of the Topping Ladder Company

Twenty-three members and guests were in attendance on April 18 for a very interesting story about the Topping family business in Marion, NY. Fifth generation family member Doug Topping told us about the various products that his family made beginning in 1860. To our surprise, ladders were not the mainstay of the business until the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. During the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Topping made a lot of custom wooden items including farm gates, apple corers, crates, fruit dryers, and even a washing machine. Doug's collection includes some GREAT salesman models of some of these products. Those of us in attendance enjoyed seeing them.



The Topping Ladder Company was sold in 1965 to a Rochester company. It remained in business in Marion until 1997 when it closed.


The **Activity Book** for elementary aged students has been released. This project, headed by Marion Historian Caryn Devlin, resulted in a 60-page book printed with County funds and is available **FREE** of charge at all public libraries in Wayne County. We are working to get copies to historical societies and others. Some of the public schools will be using them this spring with their 4<sup>th</sup> graders. Others will be using them next school year (or both years). Caryn and her team did a GREAT job.

Seven of the **Town Rack Cards** have been completed thanks to the design expertise of Amber Linson. Huron and Walworth have been printed and the others are going to press very soon. Amber also designed two topical cards, one about the Fox Sisters and Modern Spiritualism and the other about Cobblestone Masonry. These will be distributed **FREE** of charge at events around the county. More to come.

Amber Linson is also heading up the **Memories Book** project. Over 140 stories have been submitted and her team is in the process of reviewing, editing and laying out the book. It is expected to be available this fall and would make a GREAT Christmas gift. Speaking of great gifts - the Bicentennial calendars are still available from the Walworth Historical Society or at the Walworth Town Clerk's office. If someone didn't already buy you one, we suggest you buy yourself a gift calendar. It's packed with facts and photos.

Bob Mogray and the Reverse Curves Quilt Club are creating a **Wayne County Photo Quilt**. Forty photos are done and layout work has begun. A **poster** of this quilt will be created and made available, hopefully by summer. When completed the quilt will visit as many festivals and public events as possible.
