Our Copper Beech Tree: The Saga Continues By Amber Linson

A few meetings ago it was decided to have the copper beech tree at the west end of the WHS museum property taken down because of old age and more dead limbs (bottom left). After this was done, some of the WHS board members met with "Texas Dave" about the copper beach tree trunk (bottom right) on Tuesday, May 30, and he has expressed ability to plank the trunk in about 6 weeks for an estimated cost of \$700. Additionally, there will be a cost to stack and space the planks for drying and potential additional costs if the blade breaks during processing (\$65 per blade).

Highway Superintendent Kevin Switzer has offered the services of the Highway Department to transfer the log to "Texas Dave" for planking. Additionally, the Sewer Superintendent, Adam Jozwiak, has allotted space inside one of the buildings at the sewer plant for the log to dry once it has been planked. The Highway Department will also transport the log to the Sewer Department. The log needs to dry for at least 2 years before it can be used.

The WHS Building and Grounds Committee should oversee the processing of the trunk when it is being planked in 6 weeks so that we know what exactly we are getting when the job is done. Hopefully we can turn this huge log from our copper beech tree into something to remind us of its history.

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Our Collection Continues to Grow By Jessie Keymel

There are many United States flags in our collection.

The flag that is currently flying at our museum was presented to the Walworth Historical Society on the occasion of the dedication of our new building by Congressman Frank Horton. The flag was flown over the Capitol of the United States on July 4,1989.



We have the flag which was raised from atop of the United States Embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan on May 10, 2014. It was presented to our historical society by Lieutenant Colonel Jeffrey R. Bavis on his return to Walworth. Please take time to read the story of this flag; this information is in a frame which is hanging in our meeting room.

The largest flag in our collection is 12 ft. by 24 ft. It was displayed on the front of the Pacific Hotel to welcome former President Grover Cleveland when he came to Walworth for his nieces' double wedding on June 10, 1891. There are 40 stars on this flag.

When a veteran of the United States Armed Forces dies, there is often a flag draped on his coffin. This flag is given to the family in appreciation of the veteran's time spent serving our nation. We have the flag that draped World War I veteran George Frowley's coffin, when he died in 1935. The family of Howard Barmaster, WWII veteran, donated his casket flag and his Army uniform to our collection.

We also have a flag that was left at the town hall in 2004. Sadly, there was no information about who left it or owned it.

The question is often asked what to do with an old or damaged flag. The local American Legion Posts have made it easy. They will dispose of flags properly. You can leave your flag at the American Legion Post #428 at their building at 6180 Knickerbocker Road, Ontario. There is a filing cabinet at the back door that has a drawer dedicated for old flags. The American Legion Post 1430, located at 4141 Witherden Road. Marion, has a red, white and blue mailbox located outside their building to collect old flags. When the Posts schedule a ceremony for the disposal of flags, all flags donated will be included in the ceremony.



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Memories: Ronald Bruce Russell: By his sister Dawn Russell

Ronald Russell was born on January 17, 1952 at Rochester General Hospital to his parents, Bruce and Bernice Russell. Ronnie grew up in Walworth, living at his parents' home on Walworth-Ontario Road. He had four siblings: Dawn, Carol, Gary and Krisanne. Ronnie was the oldest of the five children. When younger, Ronnie would go with our parents on trips to Lake Eaton and the St. Lawrence River, where he learned how to swim.



Ronnie started school at Walworth Elementary in 1957. His kindergarten teacher was Mrs. Johnson, and his first grade teacher was Miss Fuller. He had many friends. For his 7th birthday party he invited eight of his classmates/friends, one of them being Vaughn Pembroke. While in high school, Ronnie was involved in projector club and also enjoyed mechanical drawing. He kept his drawings of a house he had drawn all those years ago. He loved listening to music such as the Beatles, Beach Boys, Jan & Dean to name a few.

Bob Mogray was in the same gym class in middle school as Ronnie. He remembers when Ronnie was called up front of the class to lead and demonstrate 30-pound weight lifting which was like a barbell. Everyone was issued the same weight, and when Ronnie led the class, being a big strong guy, the others would groan and complain. His exercises were so intense the kids were sweating profusely, arms shaking, and dropping like flies, as Bob remembers. Gym teachers would stop to watch whenever Ronnie would lead class. Bob says "Looking back now, it was really kind of comical but at the time, we thought we were doomed."

Ronnie graduated from Wayne Central in 1971. Ronnie had a great enthusiasm for cars. He owned several throughout his life. He loved his 1969 red and white Firebird (right), Sweet Innocence. He also collected many model cars. He probably got his love of cars from our dad, who was an excellent car repair and body frame specialist. Ronnie always made sure his most recent car would look pristine, and would visit his siblings' homes whenever he got a new one, feeling so proud. His good friend Danny Teske remembers many fun times with Ronnie racing their cars. One time when they were racing their cars, with Ronnie in the lead, Ronnie was stopped by the cops but wouldn't give up his friends to the cops as his friends drove by.





Another good friend of Ronnie's was Terry Spencer. Ronnie was best man in Terry's wedding and godfather to his children. He had great times with many other friends such as: Guy Carr, Kevin Rowell, Vaughn Pembroke, Grant Bradshaw, and Harlin Hilton to name a few. While growing up Ronnie was a Boy Scout, and had many memories of the Boy Scout Camp Babcock Hovey. He would talk about climbing the ravines while there and all the good times. Ronnie enjoyed family picnics. He would always show up with a Pepsi and chair in hand.

Ronnie worked for Lollypop Farm for 43 years, serving as law enforcement officer and several other capacities in his tenure. He had a love for dogs, and owned several throughout his life. His first dog was a collie named Sleepie.

Ronnie (left) loved living in the town of Walworth, and later in life would come back to visit. Sadly, Ronnie passed on April 9, 2023. He was the best older brother a sister could have.

Downs Road and the Phillips Family: Part 3 By Dorothy French

Editor's Note: The story continues with information about the Phillips family. Thank you to WHS Genealogist Ellen Dietterick for her extensive research.

According to an undated copy of "A History of the Town of Walworth" written by an unknown person, about 1855 the author's Grandpa Phillips settled on Downs Road. He came on the canal with his family from Duchess County. It is probable that this "History" was written by a descendant of either Maude or Mabel, daughters of David Phillips.

The Phillips family house was a large cut stone home located at 4371 Downs Road. It was a meeting place for all the young people. Current owners are Joel and Danielle Hoose. More info about this beautiful home and previous owners will be published in a future issue.

David Phillips (born 1776, died 1850) and Lucy Stone were parents of David and Oliver. David and Lucy were married in Windsor, Massachusetts. Their son (also named David) was born Feb. 28, 1818. Following the death of his first wife, Phoebe, David (the son) married Martha Sarah Case. They were parents of two daughters: Maude Martha and Mabel (born 1878 and 1880). When Maude was born her father was 58 and her mother was 32. David died Apr. 25, 1898 and is buried in Freewill Cemetery.

David was a farmer and also raised sheep which they sold for wool. Twice a year at sheering time they would drive the sheep four miles each way to the mill pond at Walworth to wash them. They made their own maple syrup, going to the woods with the bob sleigh and horses to gather the sap. The sap was boiled down in large kettles on the kitchen range. They took their milk to the Lincoln cheese factory. They also went to the mill in West Walworth and for other shopping.

Maude Martha Phillips (born Feb. 18, 1877 in Walworth, died Jan. 6, 1974) married Frank George Freer (1874-1934) on Mar. 24, 1897. They were parents of at least five sons and seven daughters: Agatha, John David, Mabel, Harland, Harley Wellington, Mina, Floyd George, Florence May, Frances M., Eva A., Russell, and Helen. In 1930 Maude lived in nearby Palmyra.

Mabel Phillips married James J. Downs (Jan. 2, 1879-Apr. 18, 1953) a grandson of Michael Downs. Mabel and James had three children: 1) Robert J. Downs (born Oct. 16, 1915, died June 1, 1984 in Macedon). 2) Doris Arlene Downs (born Sept. 25, 1918, died Dec. 14, 2001). Married Brayton Dygert Gardner. 3) Mary Lillis Downs (born Jan. 17, 1921, died March 16, 2017 age 96. Mary married Joseph J. Remmel and they had five children: Shirley Cicero, Joseph S. Remmel, Delores Schlicker, Mabel Farrow and James Remmel.

Buried in St. Anne's Roman Catholic Cemetery in Palmyra are James and Mabel and their children: Beth (died 1914), Robert, Doris, and Mary.

While it was not an official Bicentennial project, a ceremony was held in the Hamlet of Jov in the Town of Sodus on June 19, 2023 (the 158th anniversary of the original Juneteenth). A historic marker was dedicated commemorating the childhood home of General Gordon Granger. As you may know, it was he who delivered General Order #3 in Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865 informing the enslaved people of Texas that they were free. This was about 2 ½ years after President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. News travels slowly!

This year at the **Wayne County Fair** the theme will be the Wayne County Bicentennial. Many displays and activities will be in support of that. Four different music events (part of the Heritage Music Series) will be at the Fair AND on Saturday, August 19, FAMILY FUN DAY will focus on history. It includes music, historic re-enactors, Civil War encampments, Iroquois stories and culture, historic crafts, and programs from the Genesee Country Village and Museum. Kids are FREE that day and Adults will be able to get a coupon for free admission between 10 AM and 2 PM. Check the website.

The **Bicentennial Geocache Trail** is becoming very popular. Thirty geocaches have been put out around Wayne County (2 in each town). Those who find at least half of them and send in the form will be eligible for a drawing for prizes. The passport can be found on line, but printed copies are available from public libraries and town clerk offices in Wayne County as well at the Walworth Historical Society. The MOST UNIQUE geocache, a model of the former Walworth Academy, is at the Walworth Historical Society (left). It is easy to find, BUT in order to access it, you must find the bell (the original bell is located here in front of the museum) to put in the belltower, thus opening the cache.
