
"Photos of Walworth: Old and New" Slide Show March 18 By Bob Mogray

The Trustees of the Walworth Historical Society believe it is important for us to participate in as many community events as possible. That is why we strive to create a float for each year's Walworth Festival-In-The-Park Parade and to have a display at our booth during the festivities.

We also think it is our obligation to decorate a tree in the park for the Light the Night Program. The Walworth Recreation Department does a great job of pulling the community together for an evening of celebration each December.

For 2022 and 2023 the Walworth Historical Society decorated 2 trees. One (left photo) was done by the Walworth Home Town Heroes Committee, a subcommittee of the WHS. They won second prize! The other tree (right photo) celebrated the Holstein cattle brought to Walworth in 1879 by Theron G. Yeomans. The tree has wooden cut outs of Holsteins, small milk pails and cowbells. We didn't place in the top 3, but we are proud of it.

Soup with Dick and Jane By Gene Bavis

In 2018 we began scheduling our November programs at noon instead of in the evening AND we started serving homemade soup first. The first two programs had clever names (at least I thought so): "Soup and Suffrage" (2018) and "Soup and Spiritualism" (2019). Due to the pandemic, we didn't have lunch meetings in 2020 or 2021. We started again in 2022 with a Bicentennial program and in 2023 we thought "Soup with Dick and Jane" would be a clever title.

On November 20, about 40 people enjoyed 5 kinds of delicious homemade soups. Cindy Russell, a former teacher from Newark, then shared the story of how many of us (about 85 million) learned to read in primary grades. Students used the Dick and Jane series of reading books from the 1930's into the 1960's. She displayed many of the books from her personal collection. The program and the soup were well received. We'll do "Soup and ???" again on November 17, 2024.

Wreaths Across America and 2023 Open House By Liz Bavis

On December 16 Walworth and communities across the United State participated in the Wreaths Across America program. The program began in 1992 when the Worcester Wreath Company of Harrington, Maine had a surplus of wreaths. That year 5,000 wreaths were sent to Arlington National Cemetery to be placed on the graves of soldiers. Since that humble beginning, Wreaths Across America was established as a nonprofit in 2007. This past year over 3 million wreaths were placed at over 4,225 participating locations across the United States.

In 2020 local resident Guy Bringley presented the idea to the Walworth community of having a wreath-laying event at our cemeteries. It was met with enthusiasm. Due to the pandemic the first ceremony was delayed until December 2021 when 145 wreaths were placed at 5 different cemeteries in Walworth. At the opening ceremony at the Sherburne Road cemetery, Guy Bringley and Town Supervisor Mike Donalty spoke of the contributions of our veterans. A color guard from the Walworth Fire Department was present (left photo). Wreaths for each of the service branches were placed on frames by area Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and members of two DAR groups. Afterwards area residents took wreaths and placed them on veterans' graves in the five cemeteries (right photo). The Walworth Historical Society would like to thank Guy Bringley for bringing this program to our town.





Following the ceremony guests were invited to the Walworth Historical Society's museum. Over 50 residents came to enjoy refreshments and conversation and to see displays related to veterans and Christmas (photos below). There was a display of different military uniforms owned by the museum as well our military artifacts. Another display showed food preparation for Christmas past and present. A favorite display was antique toys which WHS members had played with when they were kids. Another display showed artifacts that highlighted life in Walworth. Linda Pembroke decorated our tree with over 100 antique Christmas postcards from her collection. Liz Bavis set up a lighted Christmas village with a farm scene and buildings related to farming. Dawn Schwind provided materials for kids of all ages to make ornaments to take home. We look forward to December 14, 2024 when we will again participate in a Christmas open house and Wreaths Across America program.

Back in December, the WHS Board of Trustees mailed a letter to our members and friends in which we requested donations for a project to update and expand our storage system. We hoped to raise at least \$1,000 to increase our shelving space and to purchase archival boxes used to preserve collection items. This campaign was necessary as our collection has grown to well over 1000 items and our preservation efforts were stretched to their limit.

Well, I am so grateful to report that we have received nearly \$3,000 from 30 generous members! With these funds we have been able to begin purchasing shelving and storage boxes (left photo) which we needed to organize the collection. The archival boxes are especially important for the preservation of books, scrapbooks, diaries, and family treasures made of paper. Without the boxes the paper will degrade faster than if they are stored in the boxes. I personally feel relieved every time we place a family album or Bible into an archival box as I know it will make these items last longer.



As we have been updating our collection database, and as we intend to organize every piece in the collection, these generous donations give us a huge boost to our organization's goals. So, to those members who responded to our call for help we would like to express a warm thank you. We will continue to do our best to preserve the artifacts precious to Walworth and the families who have called this wonderful town home.

For those of you who want to offer additional help to the WHS, we have many opportunities for volunteers of any age. For example, our collections committee needs help with accessioning, filing and refreshing displays. They meet on the first and second Wednesday of every month between 1 and 3 pm. Anyone is welcome to help. If you are good with organization and have a little extra time on your hands, please stop by and see us. We would love to have your help.

Again, THANK YOU to the individuals who helped kick start our archival project. It's generous people like you (and our volunteers) who keep this not-for-profit organization afloat!

Wayne Central To Observe 75th Anniversary By Jim Switzer

On April 29, 2024 the Wayne Central School District will observe the 75th anniversary of the centralization of 21 common and union free school districts within the towns of Ontario, Walworth, Macedon and Williamson in Wayne County and the towns of Webster and Penfield in Monroe County.

With approval of voters on April 29, 1949, an order of centralization was adopted. Nineteen common school (rural) schoolhouses and the Ontario and Walworth Union Free schools (high schools) were formally joined to create the Wayne Central School District, according to Jim Switzer, school district clerk for 33 years, retired.

The original boundary lines of the rural district school houses were combined, which is why the boundaries of the school district now extend into all of irregular portions of roads and townships. In 1972 six square miles of the original school district were ceded – by public referendum - to create approximately 50% of the new Gananda Central School District. With approval of a similar cession vote by voters of the (then) neighboring Palmyra-Macedon Central School District, the boundaries of the school district changed again to the territory now served by the 3 districts.

The first official school year of Wayne Central was 1949-50. The first graduating class entered in September 1949. The first commencement was in June 1950. The 75th anniversary of Wayne Central School District will be April 29, 2024 but the 74th commencement will be in June 2024.

Our Collection By Jessie Keymel

A visit to Boerman's Furniture Farm and Antiques on Ridge Chapel Road in Marion resulted in a valuable find – the diaries of Thomas E. Dadswell.

Alice Doyle and a friend went to Boerman's to look for old chairs to cane during the winter months. Their purchases that day included a couple of diaries from a familiar name - Thomas E. Dadswell. As they began to read them they became so interested they returned to Boerman's and purchased the remainder of the diaries. The collection of 46 diaries from 1865 until 1924 is a record of Thomas' activities and jobs then.

In February of 1902 there was a "big snowstorm and gale," The mailman could not continue his route. The snow was packed hard; drifts were 4 - 10 feet high and only allowed foot traffic. This information is from the notes Mrs. Doyle made and was included with the diaries. As I read her notes from the days following the storm, she listed the people who came to help clear the road. Later in the season the road had to be repaired and the local men hauled in sand and gravel. They worked to improve the road as maintaining it was the job of the land owners at that time.

Information about Thomas: He served in the United States Army according to the 1883 Military History of Wayne County. Thomas Dodswell (sic) July 28, 1862, Inf. Co. A; on detached service at 2nd Corps Hospital at date of general discharge June 4, 1865. Thomas is mentioned in The 111th New York Volunteer Infantry by Martin W. Husk (A Civil War History). He is also mentioned in The 1914 American Agriculturist, on page 307. Both of these publications are in Walworth Historical Society's collection.

We thank Alice Doyle for her most valuable gift and Donna Klaeysen for taking time to read and translate several of the diaries. Our collection includes diaries from other families. Call me at 315-524-9205 if you can volunteer some time to transcribe them.

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
