Anchors Away for Arnold Devlin By Dorothy French

Editor's Note: Seventeen-year-old Arnold Devlin enlisted in the United States Navy shortly after his April 9, 1947 birthday. During his tour of duty, which included the Korean War, Arnold wrote letters to his mother, Iva, of Macedon. She saved some of the letters and eventually gave them to Arnold's wife, Mary Jane Devlin. Below are snippets from these letters.



11/07/1947 – Memphis, TN: I got paid \$15 and bought shoes, two hats, neckerchief, 3 boxes of soap, a comb, and a pack of razor blades and have \$4.00 left over.

01/12/1948 – Oakland, CA: We left to go to Muir Island and I am aboard the USS Merapi. It is a freighter and only 70 serve on it. It only does 12 knots (*Editor's Note: 13.81 miles per hour*).

02/21/1948: We docked in Sasebo, Japan and then left for Tsingtao, China. They were teaching me and my buddies how to run a winch.

04/24/1948 – Honolulu, HI: Going to Pearl for an Admiral inspection. I took my progress test for Seaman First.

05/27/1948 – Oakland, CA: We are leaving the States for China. We got about 12 passengers this trip.

05/27/1948 – Sept. 1948: The USS Merapi docked in Japanese and Chinese ports. Many weeks were at sea.

09/09/1948: We are going out for gunnery practice. I will have to fire the 3" 50 (indicates 30 caliber bullet pushed by 50 grains of black powder). I hate that because it makes so much noise that you can't hear for a week. We are going to leave here September 21 for training in Guam and then back to Bremerton, Washington.

09/28/1948 – Just off Guam: We had to set condition which is war time cruising. All ports, all hatches close down and there was to be no lights on above deck.

10/19/1950: We are in Sasebo, Japan with the fleet. There are 100 ships. It took 25 days to get here from the States.

12/25/1950: Everybody who was supposed to get discharged before July 1951 has got to stay for one year. (*Editor's Note:* The Korean War started June 1950. President Harry S. Truman made the decision to postpone the discharge of all eligible military personnel. Arnold would have been eligible for discharge on February 1, 1951; his new discharge date was February 1, 1952).

04/10/1951: We have made two trips. The first was to Formosa and another island. The next was to Pusan where we stayed about four days. We gave the Army quite a lot of chow and about ten ships too. Sasebo, Japan: We were gone 15 days the last trip. I went ashore last night for the first time in almost a month.

Editor's Note: Following his February 1, 1952 discharge, Arnold returned home to Macedon. On May 7, 1955 he married Mary Jane Cauwels. In 1965 they built their home at 2447 Walworth-Marion Road where they raised three sons. Mark. Paul and Bruce. Arnold passed away November 8, 1990.

Soup and Stones By Gene Bavis

Cobblestone masonry is SO COMMON to our area that we take it for granted, but it is UNIQUE. 94% of all cobblestone structures in the WORLD are within 80 miles of Rochester, NY and Wayne County has MORE than any other county.



This topic has been studied by many architectural historians over the years and The Cobblestone Society in Albion, NY has been created to tell the story. Not only do they have a museum, they also have an extensive database listing each known structure in the world. Several years ago, Seneca County Historian Walt Gable did a program about it, but when I saw it this spring, I realized it needed updating and I also wanted to emphasize Wayne County cobblestone structures.

On Monday, November 18, I (Gene Bavis, Walworth Town Historian) will present my version of "Cobblestone Masonry" following a FREE lunch of soup & crackers, bread, beverages & desserts. Lunch will be served at NOON at the Lodge in Ginegaw Park, Walworth-Penfield Road, Walworth and the program will begin around 1 PM. The program and lunch are open to the public, so please invite your friends to join you.



Honoring Gene Bavis By Liz Bavis

At the Youth Power Dinner on October 8 Gene Bavis (left in photo) was honored by the Seneca Waterways Council of Scouts of America for his outstanding service and leadership to the community. Assemblyman Brian Manktelow (right in photo) introduced Gene to those attending the dinner. Brian went on the say that Gene has had a passion and commitment to his community his entire life. Gene has always had a passion for history and was one of the founding and charter members of the Walworth Historical Society in 1975. He has served on the board of trustees and has been town historian for 33 years.



He taught social studies at Wayne Central from 1969 to 2000. During those years he influenced 1,000s of students who even today will comment on things they remember from his classes.

Gene was active in Scouting. He was Scoutmaster for Troop 113 in Walworth. He held several positions for Finger Lake Council and played a role in the merger of Finger Lakes Council with Otetiana Council to form the present day Seneca Waterways Council. He attended five National Jamborees as well as the trip to Philmont in 1992. He was camp director at Babcock Hovey for four years. Through his encouragement, his son Jeffrey is an Eagle Scout, his twin grandsons are active in a scout troop in Henrietta, and his step-daughter recently earned her Wood Badge Training Award.

In 2019 Gene and a team of interested people began planning the 2023 Wayne County Bicentennial. As a result of this planning they were able to complete over 32 projects that spread the word about the rich history of Wayne County.

Gene has dedicated his life to education, Scouting and the community.

Turning Back the Pages – Walworth Town Board Minutes By Dorothy French

A review of town board minutes (1855 – 2005) reflects the growth and information of our Walworth township.

07/21/1994: George Schaller reported that, due to the dry weather, water usage in the six western Wayne County towns is restricted.

03/18/1999: Highway Superintendent Mike Frederes reported that from 3:30 AM on March 4 to noon March 7, 600 man hours were worked due to blizzard conditions. Highway Department employees worked 20 straight hours on March 4.

Melba Smith and Her 1919 Diary – Part 4 By Mary Jane Devlin

Editor's Note: Melba Smith was born in 1899. Melba and her parents lived on Canandaigua Road and she was a student at District #8 in 1904-05. The school was also known as Freewill and was located on the northeast corner of Atlantic Avenue and Lewis Road. Melba taught at Finley Road district school and was a faithful writer in her diary, which has been transcribed to give us a better understanding of life in 1918 - 1920. In later years she lived at 2179 Walworth-Penfield Road, the current home of Russ and Barb Kuelling. Melba died in 1971 and is buried in Baker Road Cemetery. Excerpts of her diary are printed below, thanks to Mary Jane Devlin who transcribed them.

<u>1919</u>

May/Jun: Weeded onions for Carlyle Boynton. Picked strawberries for Howard DeWind.

Aug. 16: I passed everything - Music III, Drawing II, Literature 2, Sewing.

Aug. 24: Saw "Birth of the Race" at Rialto in Geneseo.

No Date: Hired out to teach school in Finley District. Went to class picnic. Learned to row a boat. Rode on rolly

coaster, injured nose.

Sept 2: School. 26 pupils. Rode home with Ike Massielye.

Sept. 3: Rode home with Charles Tuttle.

Sept. 4: Ordered books: current events, normal Instructor and primary plans.

Sept. 8: Walked all way to school. "Farm and Home" came.

Sept. 9: Walked to school. Mother picked beans and pears at farm. Sent for record certificate.

Sept. 22: Had a ride to school nearly every day. Books came for children. Borrowed an egg from Mr. Wignall and

Bob chased A. Y., G. W., & C. K. for cooning grapes. (Some chase).

Oct. 6-7: Attended teachers' conference with Mr. McMurray, Ethel R., Susan E., and Mr. Cole.

Oct.13: Sent for book one dollar. Wesley H. waited for me to ride on coal wagon with him Wednesday.

Oct. 18: Had a ride to school and home with A. G. Clark. Got 2 lbs. of sugar.

Oct. 25: Grange fair. Misses English, Burrows and Mr. Cressey, Orman and myself went to see the "Merchant of

Venice" at the Lyceum.

Nov. 3: Jack K. took Edith M. home from church. Called truant officer for several students.

Dec.: I worked up a short program for Christmas. I gave the younger ones each a drawing tablet and crayolas.

The older girls a handkerchief, boys a pocket comb. The school gave me a lavaliere for Christmas.

Dec. 25: I sewed during most of my vacation.

Early Walworth Businesses: Milliners/Dressmakers/Hairdressers By Dorothy French

Editor's Note: Mrs. Elton (Anna) May had a love of history, resulting in scrapbooks and notebooks filled with information about our area. After Anna's death, Gordon Youngman became the keeper of her collection and subsequently donated them to the Walworth Historical Society. Below are excerpts from Anna's notes of 1958; updates have been added in italics.

Millinery Shops

1892: Mrs. Gilmore Chase and Miss Ella Hamm each had a millinery shop at 3701 Main Street.

1912: Miss Josephine Tears located her shop at that site.

Dressmakers

1892: Four women were dressmakers: Miss Josephine Tears, Miss Ella Hamm, Miss Mary Stiger, and Mrs. Henry Bean. Miss Tears and Miss Hamm had a shop together (*3701 Main Street*). Mrs. Bean was living on Rochester Street (*2203 Walworth-Penfield Road*) where she did her dressmaking.


Hairdressers

1892: Mortimer Hathaway was a hairdresser.

1944: Irene Degroot opened a beauty shop in the area formerly occupied by the U.S. Post Office in the Pacific Hotel/Grange Hall *(3713 Main Street);* she closed the shop in 1947.

1914 American Agriculture Farm Directory By Jessie Keymel

Hidden in plain sight or on the bookshelf on the south side at the east end of our museum's main room are two copies of a 1914 farm directory. The farm directories were published by the <u>American Agriculturist</u>, a weekly agricultural newspaper with weather, crop and market reports, news about farm, activities, and up-to-date information on farming practices. All this is included in a subscription that costs \$1.00 a year, The <u>American Agriculturist</u> was started in1842 and is still available in many specialty farm magazines for \$35.00 a year.



Our <u>Farm Directory</u> lists every farm in Ontario and Wayne Counties. A map was included, which we have enlarged and mounted to make it more reader friendly. The listings include details about the farms and their families. Walworth (population 2,187) township begins on page 377, starting with <u>"Abraham, Charles F. farmer bds L C. Saas rd 1 Walworth H37"</u> and ending with <u>"Yuker, Truman H. (Clara) 2 ch farmer O 54a rd1 Walworth H46 B T"</u>. Each listing includes the owner, marital status, wife's name, number of children, occupation, and number of acres farmed. Therefore, Truman and Clara Yuker had 2 children, farmed, and owned 54 acres on RD1 in Walworth; H46 is his location on the map and B T tells us his phone is with Bell Telephone.

Page 9 has explanations and lists abbreviations to tell us a lot about life in Wayne County in 1914. The abbreviations include nine different telephone companies, whether the land is rented or owned, and who resides in the house including maid or housekeepers. I looked up George Millen. He did not own property at that time, but he was a farm hand and lived in a rented home; his family and the phone company he used were listed.

Everyone was listed: physicians, pastors, teachers, storekeepers, milliners, blacksmiths, millers, farm hands, builders, and all the assorted occupations that are necessary to keep a village growing. These two books sit in the middle of our collection, unnoticed, but a great source of knowledge for those looking for past family residents in our busy little town in 1914.


